

A Word from the Playwright Thomas Ward

This play came fast and furious, which is unusual for me. Typically I wrestle with plays for a year or more before the first draft is finished, but International Falls poured out in a month or two and I'm not sure why. The only thing autobiographical about it is the setting and the world of stand up. I worked as a stand up comic from 2002-2004, ending up as a feature act opening for headliners no one has ever heard of in various bars in the south and midwest. One of those gigs took me to International Falls, MN for two nights. I don't remember much about the gig except that I ended up in a shouting match with a heckler from Canada. I was struck by the snow and the desolation of the place. Cut to eight years later, and I'd become hooked on podcasts, with stand up as a distant, albeit vivid, memory in my career. Pretty much every comedian has a podcast these days and I listen to a lot of them. One of my favorites is called WTF with comedian Marc Maron. It's candid conversation with funny people. What strikes me is the sadness that many professional funny people carry, and from what harsh backgrounds their comedy often springs. The cliche is that comedy comes from pain, and ultimately International Falls is an exploration and test of that idea.



Thomas Ward is a writer and actor based in Minneapolis. His play *Keeping Watch* was premiered by Theatrical Outfit (Atlanta, GA) and named "Best All Around Play" of the 2006 season by Creative Loafing magazine. His play *Binge* won the Texas Playwriting Competition by Stage West Theatre (Fort Worth) before receiving its New York premiere by SLANT Theatre Project. He co-wrote the play *Going with Jenny* with his wife Sherry Jo Ward, which was performed in Atlanta, GA and Austin, TX. A workshop production of *International Falls* was named "Best of Fest" at the Out of the Loop Fringe Festival in Dallas, TX. Also a screenwriter, Thomas co-wrote the screenplay of the independent feature film *Sironia* which premiered at the Austin Film Festival and took home an audience award. He wrote and directed the short film "In the Middle" that was screened at numerous film festivals across the country and can be found online. He is currently adapting *International Falls* for the screen and has completed a new full length play entitled *Slide By*, an exploration of school violence. The History of CoHo Productions

CoHo's first show, *Bodyhold*, took place in the basement of the Benson Hotel in 1995. Penned by Gary Cole and directed by Robert Holden, the company's co-founders, Bodyhold enjoyed a colorful and successful run, in part fueled by solid beverage sales and the arrival of the Portland police one evening in response to a hotel guest's worry over hearing gun shots (the play was set in the middle of a Third World revolution!). It was quite the auspicious beginning for a theater company whose first production literally opened "on Broadway".

Two Pearl District storefronts, one empty warehouse, one art gallery, a business office and one NW storefront later, you sit tonight in a former bookbindery that became CoHo's permanent home in 2000. Partial credit for the search for a real home must be given to the poor actress who was forced to quit the last storefront production halfway through the show's run due to an asthmatic reaction to dust and grime.

Now in our 17th season, CoHo can boast 48 productions, 13 world premieres (including *International Falls* which you are seeing tonight), and 23 Drammy awards. Our productions have represented well-established playwrights like David Mamet and Eugene O'Neill but have also provided a forum for local Portland luminaries like William S. Gregory and Ebbe Roe Smith to bring their work to life. Our stage has been the early stomping grounds for once fledgling companies like Third Rail Rep who have gone on to their own tremendous successes in the world of Portland theater. And finally, our NEW X NW new play competition, now in its fifth year, has celebrated the writings of home grown playwrights by providing professionally directed staged readings during the annual Fertile Ground festival. We are very proud to say that our 2011 NEW X NW winner, Susan Mach's *A Noble Failure*, is now receiving a full production as part of Third Rail Rep's main stage season.

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
